Reflections on a Remarkable Life

June A. Delph was born in the small community of East Bernstadt, Kentucky on February 9, 1933. She and her three sisters, Wilma, Mavis and Pat, were known then and now as The Allen Girls. She met her future husband, Harold, at the Hazel Green School when she was nine years old.

June and Harold married on July 7, 1950 and moved to Chicago where they lived until they moved to Cincinnati in 1952. They had two children; Linda, the first-born and Paul. The 1980's produced two grandchildren: Linda's daughters Kristen and Caitlin.

June worked for the University of Cincinnati for many years and then earned her real estate license in 1978. She quickly earned her broker's license and opened the very successful June A. Delph Realty in 1980.

When June and Harold's son, Paul, came out to them as a gay man with AIDS in the early 1990's, June began to educate herself about gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender people. She subscribed to *The Advocate* and read everything she could find about the GLBT community. In January, 1996, Paul moved home from L.A. and June closed her realty business to care for him until he died at the age of 39.

After Paul's death, June and Harold became involved with the local GLBT community. They created the Paul L. Delph Memorial Scholarship fund. June had an AIDS Memorial Quilt panel created for Paul. She never missed a Cincinnati Men's Chorus or MUSE concert.

Along the way, June began wearing what became her signature, a red ribbon AIDS awareness pin and a button that read "I'm straight but not narrow." Every day, whether or not she planned to leave the house, she placed the two pins on the

left side of her outfit. She received many comments from complete strangers over the years regarding the button, nearly all of them positive.

June, Harold and daughter Linda were co-presidents of PFLAG Cincinnati (Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays) for three years. They touched many lives during the monthly PFLAG support group meetings.

June and Harold also became close friends with the Imperial Sovereign Queen City Court of the Buckeye Empire ("The Court") after Court members held several fundraising drag shows for the PFLAG scholarship program. As soon as Court members got to know June they adopted her and she them. In 2004 The Court bestowed one of their highest honors on June, the Lydia Grant Humanitarian Award.


